**3-Year-Old Kindergarten  
2017-2018**

The Tigerton School District will again be offering a 3-Year Old Kindergarten program during the 2017-18 school year. Students will learn communication and language development, prewriting, social and emotional development, physical skills, cognitive development, math and science skills, and character education.

Children must be three years of age by September 1, 2017, and potty trained to enroll. The 3-Year Old Kindergarten program is open to both resident and non-resident children. Two sessions will be held. One session will be held on Tuesdays and Thursdays and the other one will be held on Mondays and Wednesdays from 8 until 11:30 a.m. at the Tigerton Elementary School. Busing to and from school will be available for children residing in the School District of Tigerton. Enrollment fees for the program are \$45 per month per child. Enrollment is limited and available on a first come first served basis.

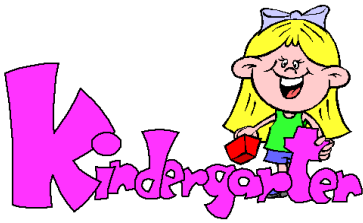

In addition to the pallet garden, the class planted a garden in a wooden frame donated by the Kielblock family. This new garden allowed the class to plant veggies, such as, carrots, that are not able to be grown in the pallet garden. The class also started some tomato and pepper plants from seeds earlier this spring. Some of these plants were then transplanted in the garden (the students also were each able to take home a tomato plant for their own garden). After the school year is over, the garden will be cared for by some of the summer school students.

The students took a guided tour to explore the plants and nature. The tulips and lilacs were in full bloom. It was a beautiful sight!

In the afternoon, the students toured the Bay Beach Wildlife Sanctuary. They saw geese, wolves, a bobcat, and an otter, along with many other mammals, birds, and reptiles.

## Ecosystems in Balance

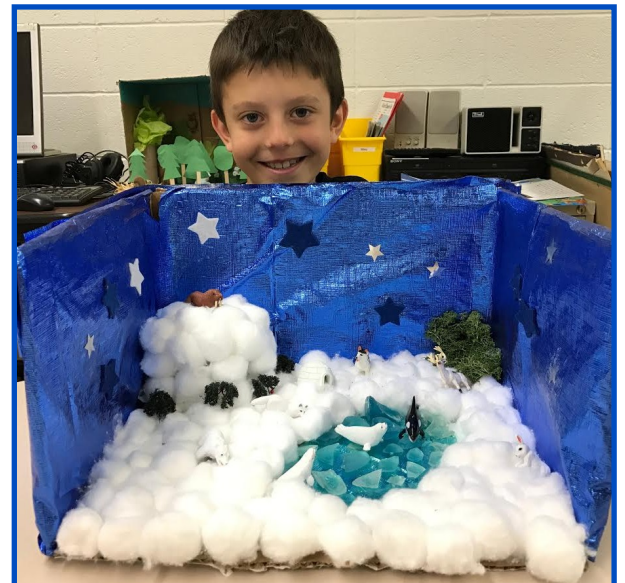
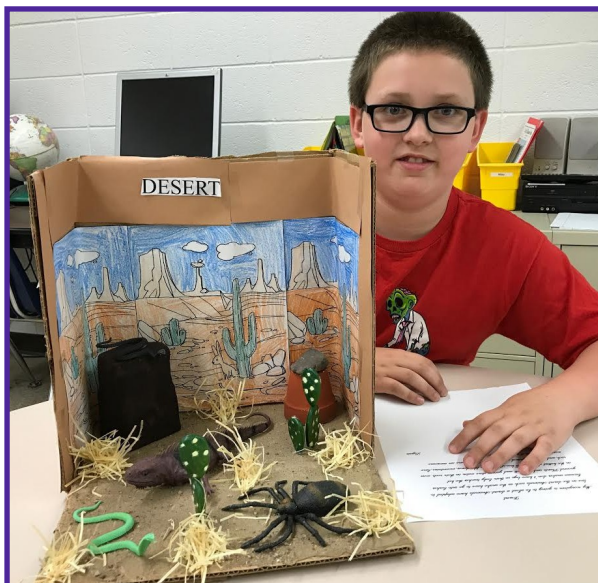
In Mrs. Brady's third grade class, students learned about a variety of ecosystems. Ecosystems are made up of consumers, producers, and decomposers that depend on each other to live. Students learned that organisms need to compete and adapt in their environments. They also studied that changes to an ecosystem affect plants and animals that live there. Each student was asked to research an ecosystem and then create a diorama (3-D visual) along with a short report containing a description of their ecosystem, living and nonliving organisms that live in the ecosystem, and what they learned while doing their project.

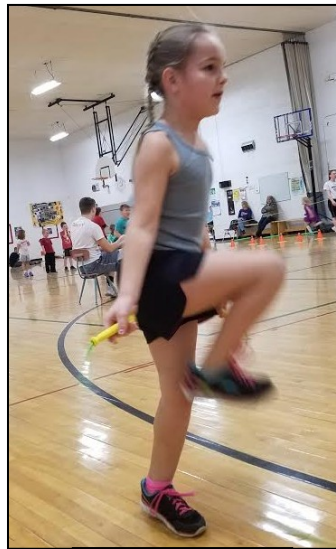
# Elementary



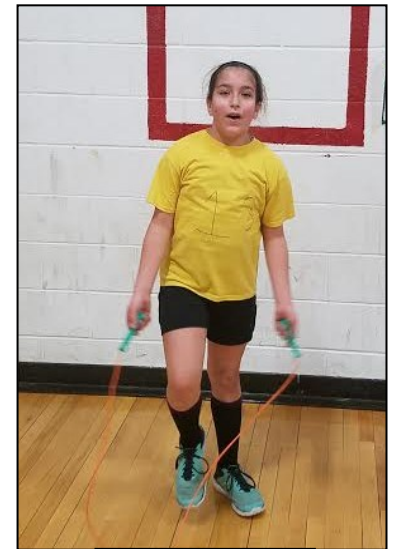

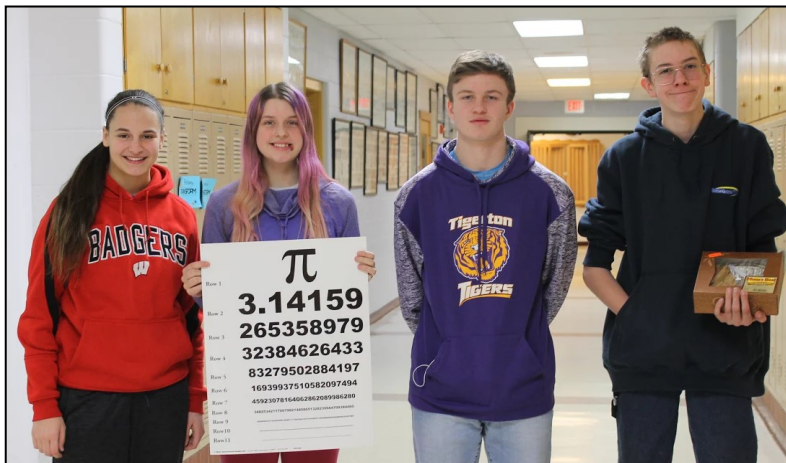

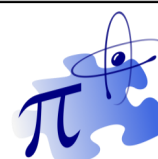


## Pi Day Celebration

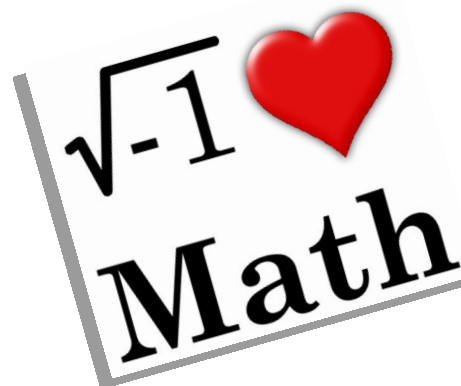
## Girls Headed to UWGB

The University of WI-Green Bay hosts the Regional Center for Math & Science (RCMS) program each summer. Assistant Director Myra Gilreath met with Ms. Krolow's geometry students in February to discuss this exciting educational opportunity. Raven Dewhurst and Molly Brehm have been accepted into the Regional Center for Math & Science (RCMS) program. The RCMS program is a TRIO Upward Bound Math Science program that serves first generation college bound students (high school juniors & seniors) who are interested in careers in the STEM fields. RCMS is a federally funded, six week residential pre-college program, designed to enhance and enrich high school students' understanding of science, mathematics, and the nature of scientific research. This program is completely free to participants.

Students from all over Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Michigan come to live on UW-Green Bay's campus for six weeks each summer. They live the college experience: taking classes from professors, living and eating on campus, and being independent from their families and friends at home. Students will also travel to other area colleges, museums, and places where students can see their potential future career in action, such as the Medical College of Wisconsin or the Space Science & Engineering building at UW-Madison. RCMS recruits high-achieving students with college potential, and their commitment to the program will last two full years. Nearly 100% of RCMS students will enroll in a 4-year college after their senior year of high school, and continue on to earn their bachelor's degrees. Congratulations to Molly and Raven! Molly is the daughter Brad & Janet Brehm. Raven is the daughter of Shelby Dewhurst & Kim Hallett. Leah Jobe and Shawnee Griepentrog were accepted last spring and will participate in the second year of the program.

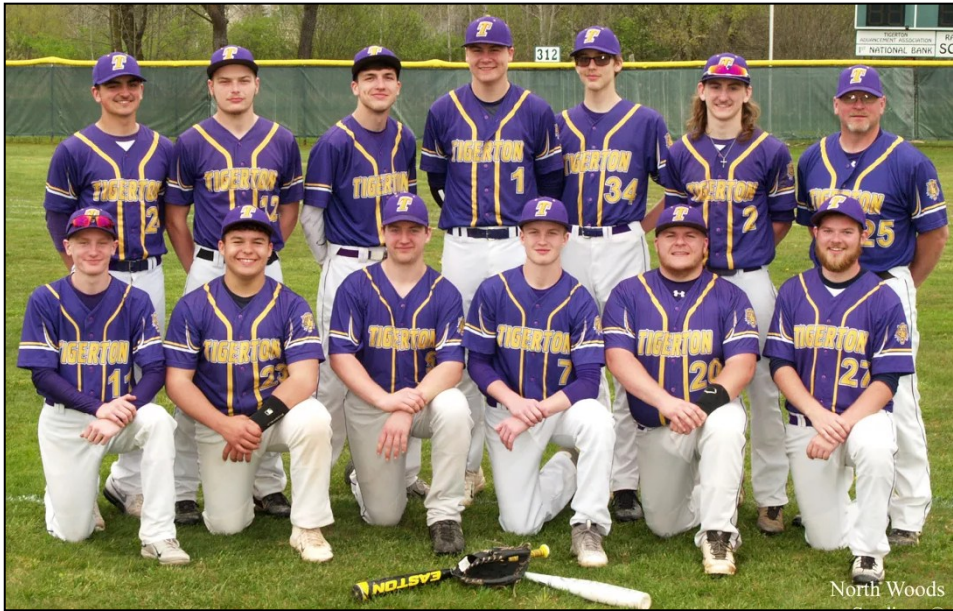

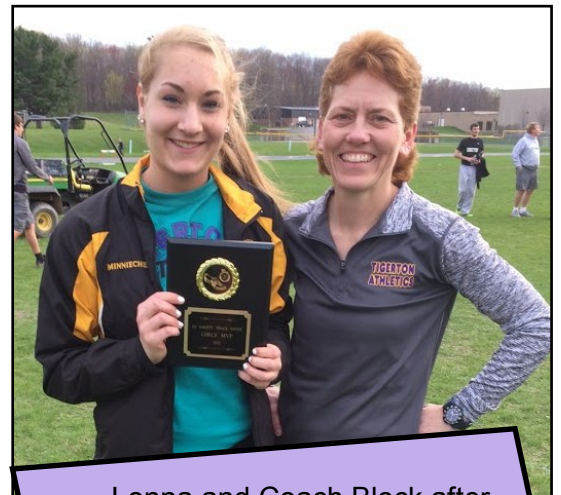

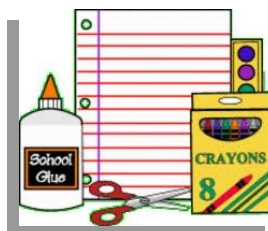
