





3-Year-Old Kindergarten 2018-2019

The School District of Tigerton will again be offering a 3-Year Old Kindergarten program during the 2018-19 school year. Students will learn communication and language development, prewriting, social and emotional development, physical skills, cognitive development, math and science skills, and character education.

Children must be three years of age by September 1, 2018, and potty trained to enroll. The 3-Year Old Kindergarten program is open to both resident and non-resident children. Currently one session is scheduled to be held Tuesdays and Thursdays from 8 until 11:30 a.m. at the Tigerton Elementary School. If there is enough interest another session will be added for Mondays and Wednesdays. Busing to and from school will be available for children residing in the School District of Tigerton. Enrollment fees for the program are \$45 per month per child. Enrollment is limited and available on a first come first served basis.


I hope everyone has a safe and active summer!



FFA Happenings by Bethany Kreklow, FFA Reporter

On January 12-13, Molly Brehm and I went to the Wisconsin Halftime Conference at the Holiday Inn Convention Center in Stevens Point. We had a lot of fun, learned about the awesome FFA opportunities during the second half of the year, more ways to better our chapter, and worked on our leadership skills by doing group activities with other FFA members.



The club was very busy fundraising this year. We sold Danish Kringles, products from the Great American Opportunities catalog in February, and helped the FFA Alumni with meat raffle tickets in December. They will use the money raised to send people to FFA leadership conferences, help with service learning projects around the Tigerton community, and to go on our summer FFA trip to Minocqua, WI.

On Saturday, January 27, we hosted a Community Rabies Vaccination Clinic with the Birnamwood Veterinary Clinic. More than 70 dogs and cats were vaccinated during the event. The FFA chapter sponsored a noisy can collection and pet supply drive for the Happily Ever After Animal Sanctuary and Shawano County K-9 Program. Three large boxes of supplies were collected and \$100 was split between the two organizations.

To get our fellow students interested in FFA and promote agriculture, we sponsored activities for National FFA Week (February 18-24) and National Ag Week (March 18-24). There were school-wide dress up days. They held contests during lunch like haystack eating contests. They also had a Kiss An Animal contest. The three teachers with the most money in their bucket at the end of National Ag Week had to kiss animals in front of the entire school. They were Mrs. Joan Meeder, Art teacher, had to kiss a baby goat; Mr. Chad Pritzl, HS Science teacher, had to kiss a guinea pig; and Mrs. Peggy Erickson, English teacher, had to kiss the mystery animal, a stuffed raven.

In early April, FFA members and a few high school students took turns going to the elementary school to teach the district fourth grade students about dairy production and Wisconsin agriculture as part of the Adventures in Dairyland program. They just recently visited the Norrbom Dairy farm in Elderon where they saw robotic milkers in action.

On April 13, we hosted our biennial Youth Safety Fair at Tigerton Elementary School. The kids learned things about sun safety, fire safety, firearms safety, ATV/boating safety, and about different disabilities and emergency scenarios. FFA members ran some of the stations and assisted the kids with the activities. The FFA Alumni sponsored a Coloring Contest/Poster Design Contest for the elementary students. All participants received a candy bar and a top winner was selected in each grade level.

The Horticulture class grew plants and held a plant sale this spring. The plants were sold as a fundraiser for the green-house building fund for the Agriculture Department.

FFA members who earned enough reward points travelled to the Minocqua area on June 6 for the Summer FFA trip. Several FFA members and their advisor attended the State FFA Convention in Madison June 11-14. Casey Wuske will be going to the Washington Leadership Conference in Washington, D.C. in July.

Taryn Graham, a freshman at Tigerton High School has been accepted into a 3-year college program. The University of WI—Green Bay hosts the Regional Center for Math & Science (RCMS) program each summer. Assistant Director Myra Gilreath met with Tigerton's 9th and 10th grade students in March to discuss this exciting educational opportunity. Taryn completed the extensive application and has been awarded the opportunity to participate in the Regional Center for Math & Science (RCMS) program. The RCMS program is a TRIO Upward Bound Math/Science program that serves first generation college bound students who are interested in careers in the STEM fields. RCMS is a federally funded, six week residential pre-college program, designed to enhance and enrich high school students' understanding of science, mathematics, and the nature of scientific research. This program is completely free to participants. Students from all over Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Michigan live on UW-Green Bay's campus for six weeks each summer. They participate in many college experiences: taking classes from professors, living and eating on campus, and

being independent from their families and friends at home. Students will also travel to other area colleges, museums, and places where students can see their potential future career in action, such as the Medical College of Wisconsin or the Space Science & Engineering building at UW-Madison. The program will continue in fall with online activities. RCMS recruits high-achieving students with college potential, and their commitment to the program will last three full years. Nearly 100% of RCMS students will enroll in a 4-year college after their senior year of high school, and continue on to earn their bachelor's' degrees. Congratulations to Taryn! Taryn is the daughter of Laura Derks and Curtis Graham.



Middle School Basketball
















The 2018 Tigerton Middle School 7th grade girls basketball team consisted of three 7th graders and four 6th grad-
